ARE YOU READY FOR SPACE TRAVEL

Since Astronaut Alan B. Shepard made his flight into space, and was followed later by Astronaut John H. Glenn, the USA has been looking for more candidates to train for two and three man flights into space. The need for the right kind of men with the special training is very important. would need many thousands of dollars worth of sports and athletic equipment.

"Camping and hiking equipment will be needed; canoes, boats and fishing equipment, water skis, softball, kickball, vollyball equipment, bicycles, and much special equipment will be required to train these youngsters in arts and crafts.

"You Church members should join this effort and search your garages, attics, cellars, utility closets to see what is in storage that can be used. Out of storage came tents, cots, camping equipment of all sorts.

"Mr. Lewis Greenwood, of the Headquarters' Church donated a 12' mahogany plyboard boat, fully equipped with 2 HP outboard motor. The Spokesman Clubs are now planning to assist in supplying as much of this equipment as they are able — but it will be impossible for a few clubs to supply all the need.

"If enough members and enough clubs supply the need out of storage, however, the committee planning the Summer Educational Program will not only have sufficient, but will also consider admitting another hundred or two boys and girls. The original figure was set at 100 boys and 100 girls. This was because of the shortage of equipment.

"We have adequate personnel consisting of trained instructors from our own Imperial Schools and Ambassador College, administrators, nurses, etc. Our main shortage right now is equipment!

"What's gathering dust in your garage that might solve a portion of this problem? What you have might be just the thing to help send another boy or girl to camp. Contact a Spokesman or drop a card to the Editor — you might have just what we need.

Feminine Features

ENCHILADAS

2 pkg. corn tortillas 1/2 lb. grated cheese 1 medium onion chopped 2 tablespoon oil 2 tablespoon chili powder 1 cup water dash of salt

Mix the chili powder in 1 cup of water, and simmer with the oil for about 5 minutes; adding salt. Keep over very low heat.

Place 1 tortilla at a time in the mixture, and remove quickly onto a platter. Put cheese and onion in the middle of tortilla and roll. Follow the same steps for each tortilla.

(NOTE: Cook chili-meat sauce to pour over enchiladas, in advance. Follow recipe below.)

1 lb. ground meat

2 tablespoons oil

1 or 2 tablespoons chili powder

1 tablespoon flour ½ cup tomato sauce

1- clove garlic, mashed

1/4 teaspoon comino (ground)

dash of black pepper 1 teaspoon salt

Heat oil in pan. Add meat and brown. Now stir in flour and let brown. Blend rest of ingredients together with tomato sauce, and add to meat. Pour over about 2 cups boiling water. Simmer for 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add more water if mixture gets too thick.

Line enchiladas in a 14 x 9 inch Pyrex dish or pan. Pour Chili on top to cover well. Sprinkle with grated cheese, and put in the oven till cheese melts.

ARROZ CON POLLO (Chicken with Rice)

1 ready to cook fryer chicken, disjointed

1/2 cup uncooked rice

1/2 cup tomato sauce 1 tablespoon chopped onion

1 tablespoon chopped green pepper

1/4 teaspoon ground comino seed 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper 1 med. size clove garlic, mashed

2 teaspoons salt (more or less, according to taste)

water: from a pint to a quart

Put 2 tablespoons of oil in heavy skillet, and brown chicken over medium heat for 15 to 20 minutes. Turn fire off. Stir in all the ingredients above, except rice and water. Set aside.

Place rice in separate skillet with 1 tablespoon of oil and brown in cooked rice well over low heat. Add to the chicken mixture. Add the boiling water. Cover, and cook for 45 minutes or longer until rice is tender.

TACOS

1/2 lb ground meat

2 tablespoons oil

1 small clove garlic, mashed

1 tablespoon chopped onion

1 teaspoon flour

dash of black pepper

1/4 cup canned tomatoes

salt, according to taste

1/4 cup water

Fry meat in skillet until brown. Add flour and onion and let brown together for about one minute, stirring constantly. Blend together tomatoes, water, and seasonings. Add to meat. Cook over low heat for five minutes.

Crisp taco tortillas by placing one at a time in hot oil. Fold tortilla in the middle, but do not let edges stick together. Put small amount of cooked meat in the center of tortilla. Fill each taco with shredded lettuce and chopped tomatoes.

Makes 10 or 12 tacos.

GUACAMOLE (Avocado Salad)

3 avocados 2 tomatoes

1 small hot pepper, mashed (optional)

salt, according to taste

Peel avocodos and mash well. Mash or grate tomatoes. Add them to avocados, pepper, and salt. Blend well.

Garnish with lettuce if desired. This also makes a tasty dip for corn chips.
