Upset weather has been one of the biggest sources of news in South Texas during the year now ended. All of the area newspapers have been reporting UNUSUAL weather! In 1962, the opposite extremes of hot and cold, wet and dry have been experienced in this area.

In early January, the coldest spell on record roared down on South Texas and fastened its icy grip on the Rio Grande Valley, doing tremendous damage. Ten years would not be time enough for the citrus industry in the Valley to recover. (According to early reports, much the same thing has just happened in the Florida citrus belt, before twelve full months have rolled around.)

Then, with the coming of spring, the weather became very dry. The moisture was so lacking it was a struggle for the farmers to even sprout their seed in the ground in many sections. The grain and the cotton languished in the field for lack of rain; and then when spotty rains came in June, it was too late to be fully effective in many areas. And yet, there were SPOTS that had ample rain right along.

With the coming of fall, when we normally expect September rains, they were slow in coming, and once more, very spotty. It seemed the same areas that received good rains in the spring were the areas receiving them again in the fall.

A most unusual year, weatherwise—a warning of things to come!

Feminine Features

ORANGE DATE CAKE

1/2 lb. butter

2 cups sugar Cream together

- 4 eggs add one at a time beating after each
- 1 1/3 cups buttermilk
- 1 tsp. soda (dissolve in buttermilk)
- 4 cups flour (measure after sifting) small pinch salt

(resift salt and flour together)

Add buttermilk alternately with flour to sugar, butter mixture, beating after each addition. Add 2 heaping table-spoons grated orange rind, 1 lb. chopped dates and 1 cup nuts.

Cook in tube pan or loaf pan 1½ hours; 300 degree oven.

TOPPING

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup fresh orange juice
- 2 tablespoons grated orange rind

Boil 5 minutes. Pour over hot cake and leave in pan until cool.

THREE IN ONE

- 1 green pepper (chopped)
- 2 onions (chopped)
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 large can corn (cream style)
- salt and pepper to taste
- 4 tomatoes, sliced

buttered bread crumbs

Saute pepper and onion in butter until light brown; add meat and cook until browned.

Place alternate layers of meat and corn in buttered baking dish, seasoning with salt and pepper. Arrange sliced tomatoes over top; cover with buttered crumbs. Bake at 350 degrees until crumbs are brown.

CLOTHING CARE

If white clothes are treated in the following manner they will be rid of the soap film which causes them to turn various shades of gray and yellow.

Place all the white articles in very hot water in the washing machine with detergent and bleach and run for two minutes. Stop the machine and let clothes soak for ten minutes. Start the machine and finish the cycle. Then repeat the whole cycle using vinegar only and omitting the soaking period.

The clothes will stay white through repeated washings unless mixed with other soap-filled clothes. Remember, overloading, too much soap and mixing white clothes with colored articles will defeat your purpose.

With all the new and wonderfully washable fabrics on the market today, it is a wise shopper who reads all tags and labels carefully. All the better lines of clothing have the fiber content listed and instructions for the care of your garment.

Wash and wear fabrics are chemically modified or resin treated to help shed wrinkles and to dry smoothly. Most have good shape retention and need no starch.

Not all colors and dyes are equally washable, so save yourself a disappointment by reading the directions.
