College aids community, serves as Job Fair host

PASADENA - Ambassador College will serve as host for some 35 corporations and 27 community service agencies participating in the annual Pasadena Job Fair April 25 in the college gymnasium here.

Sponsors of this year's fair are the Pasadena Chamber of Commerce. City of Pasadena Human Relations Committee, Project LIFT (an assistance program for the handicapped), Pasadena Urban Coalition and the Pasadena Urban League.

From 1,200 to 1,500 job seekers are expected to attend, says George A. Jones, a management consultant serving as Job Fair coordinator.

"The Job Fair provides an opportunity for unemployed people to do a supermarket search for jobs at one site," Mr. Jones added. "And it is certainly to the advantage of the em-ployers to be exposed to 1,500 people in one day. "This has been one of the most

successful ventures of recent years in Pasadena," he continued, "because from the beginning the employers have actively participated in producing the fair by serving on the committees, recruiting and providing supplies. That's unique in job fairs. "It is difficult to track the results

accurately, but we do know that over 300 people have been employed through the efforts of the Job Fair since it began.

"Organizing the first fair was difficult and discouraging until Ambassador College came forward to provide the facilities, which covered a tremendous share of the cost. It is a fact that we could never have done it without Ambassador.

"This is a community effort, not a commercial venture," Mr. Jones stated

Participating community service "will see that we have a agencies good cross section of people from the community participating as ap-plicants," said Rod McIver, supervisor of vocational training and job placement for Project LIFT. These agencies will be explaining their services as well as taking job applications at the fair.

Among the corporations participating in this year's Job Fair are Aerojet Electro Systems, American

Business Service Corp., Ameron, Automobile Club of Southern California, Bell & Howell, Burroughs Corp., Electronic Resources, Glendale Federal Savings, Jacobs Engineering Group, Lincoln Na-tional Life Insurance, The Marquardt Co., Nack & Sunderland, Stuart Pharmaceuticals, Thomas Temporaries, Textron and Xerox Corp

Some of the participating community agencies are the American Red Cross, California Employment Development Department, City of Pasadena Personnel Department, El Centro de Accion Social, Jackie Robinson Center, Placement Service for Older Workers, Project JOVE II, Villa Esperanza and the Welfare **Rights** Organization.

Time to give serious thought to Festival plans, says director

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By Ken Tate PASADENA — New, nearly new and old favorites are the rule for sites chosen for the 1979 Feast of Tabernacles in the continental United States, according to Sherwin McMichael, director of the Festival Office

Listed are one new site. Biloxi, Miss; second-year sites Fresno, Calif., Norfolk, Va., Saratoga Springs, N.Y., Savannah, Ga., and Seattle, Wash.; and four old-timers, Lake of the Ozarks, Mo., St. Petersburg, Fla., Tucson, Ariz., and Wisconsin Dells, Wis

Housing sign-ups of motels and campgrounds for the sites are half accomplished, Mr. McMichael said, with the remainder to be completed soon. Applications will be distributed during May, he added.

"It hardly seems possible that it is time once more to begin planning to observe the Feast of Tabernacles, but it is!" Mr. McMichael said, emphasizing that families should begin to give serious thought to Festival plans, including where to attend the 1979 Feast

Following are descriptions of each site.

26 miles of beach

Biloxi, Miss.: Described as the 'closest semitropical seacoast" to the entire Mid-American area, Biloxi basks in a warm climate on the Gulf Coast.

The only new site for 1979, it replaces the site at Big Sandy, Tex. Services will take place in the 12,000-seat Mississippi Coast Coliseum and Convention Center, de-scribed by Mr. McMichael as "the finest auditorium we will be using this year.

The convention center is but a stone's throw from a portion of the 26 miles of beach connecting the nearby cities of Biloxi, Gulfport, Long Beach and Pass Christian. New Or leans is an easy 70-mile drive on an interstate highway.

Fresno, Calif .: In its second year as a Feast site. Fresno will once again play host to the Festival in the award-winning Selland Arena. Fresno is in the heart of one of the

world's largest agricultural counties. It has also been called the "Gateway to the National Parks," being conve-niently located near Yosemite, Sequoia and King's Canyon parks.

The best of two worlds

Norfolk, Va.: Cradled on the Atlantic seaboard and boasting a seaport that ranks first in the United States in volume of export cargo, Norfolk offers the best of two worlds.

The Festival, held for the second year in the futuristic Scope Convention Center, points to Norfolk's modern heritage while the historic sites of Williamsburg and Jamestown are less than an hour away.

Savannah, Ga.: Historic is the catchword in Savannah, another second-year Feast site.

This charming Southern waterfront town boasts more than 1,100 historically significant buildings, many dating to colonial times and many within walking distance of the downtown Savannah Civic Center site of Festival services.

The easy-going hospitality of this outhern city is sure to make it a favorite again this year.

Saratoga Springs, N.Y.: Centered on the grounds of the 2,000-acre Saratoga Spa State Park, the

5,100-seat Saratoga Performing Arts Center will again house Feast activities in the Northeast United States.

The idyllic resort setting has internationally known mineral baths and springs, two golf courses, three swimming pools and numerous pic-nic groves. To the north is Lake George, bordered by majestic forests that invite hiking, boating and fishing.

The Saratoga Chamber of Commerce reports that plans are going ahead on the enclosure of the open air art center. This important project should be completed by the Feast.

In the beautiful Northwest

Seattle, Wash.: Located in the beautiful Northwest, Seattle, which divides the Pacific Ocean and the majestic Cascade mountains, is truly an inspiring Feast site.

Services will take place for the second year in the Seattle Center, site of the 1962 World's Fair.

Seattle's waterfront is blanketed with colorful and quaint shops, markets and seafood restaurants. The area also affords the opportunity for a memorable ferry ride to one of the outlying islands in the bay.

Lake of the Ozarks. Mo .: Nestled in the wooded hills of scenic Mis-souri, Lake of the Ozarks will be the site of longest standing in 1979. The Feast, observed on Church-owned property, will be in its 11th year at the Ozarks

The Lake region, termed by environmental experts as "one of the seven best places to live in the United States," offers 1,175 miles of shoreline for the enjoyment of Feastgoers. (See FEAST, page 9)

Storms take homes, but not members' lives

WICHITA FALLS, Tex. While thousands of members of God's Church were preparing for Passover services the afternoon and evening of April 10, many members in Wichita Falls, Vernon, Tex., Lawton, Okla., and surrounding areas were apprehensively watching the threatening black clouds gather ing near their homes. Black clouds always portend a storm in that section of the United States in the spring.

But it was more than a 50-mile trip to Passover services in the Montego Bay Motel at Lawton for members living here, so they were on the road when the deadly tornadoes struck their city about 6 p.m. By this time other tornadoes had already cut a swath through Vernon and Lawton, leaving death and destruction in their paths. (The final death toll was reported as three in Lawton, 11 in Vernon and 44 here, with estimated dam-age of more than \$250 million.)

Little warning given

"I really felt that Satan was trying to keep us from the Passover, but we made it," said Sharron Meek of Lawton to *The Worldwide News* by tele-phone April 17, "It took almost every house around us; we were left standing in the middle of it."

Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Meek's home, according to their stopped clock, was struck by the tornado at 5:10 p.m. Mr. Meek was at work, but Mrs. Meek and her two children, a daughter, 7, and a son, 5, were in their home when they heard a single blast from Lawton's storm warning system. The tornado struck almost simultaneously along a path in front of their home.

The Meeks' home sustained damage to the roof, many windows were blown out, and a falling tree struck their automobile, but Mrs. Meek and her children escaped injury. "Every-

body that's come by has said they can't understand it — that this house should have gone. We were right in the path, right in the middle of it," Mrs. Meek said.

Namibia's independence be achieved peacefully, with moderate leaders emerging in control, or will yet another African territory be plunged another African territory be plunged into the maelstrom of internecine tri-bal and ethnic warfare — possibly with a totalitarian regime allied to Moscow emerging the victor from the bloodied ashes? There is a cocktail mix of parties involved in the dispute at the mo-ment: South Africa, present authority in the territory under an old League of Nations mandate; the United Nations, which claims succession to the League's mandate responsibility and declares South Africa's authority to be illegal; SWAPO, the militant be illegal; SWAPO, the minitan South-West African People's Or-ganization, whose externally based guerrilla bands launch repeated night raids from bases in neighboring Angola and Zambia, the neighboring, so-called front-line states, who pro vide terrorist sanctuaries as well moral support for SWAPO; the Western powers "contact group" (the United States, Great Britain, Canada, France and West Ger-many), who represent the United Nations as a broker between South Af-

In light of the recent U.S. Supreme Court decision involving CBS and 60 Minutes, we will have a greater opportunity to recover substantial ages.

rica and SWAPO, but clearly lean in favor of the latter; and the moderate political leaders representing the vast majority of the people of Namibia, whose wishes have largely fallen on deaf ears at the United Nations.

The preference of the Third World The preference of the finite wond and Communist-dominated United Nations is well known; it unreserv-edly supports SWAPO, having years ago declared it to be "sole and authentic representative" of the Namibian people, to the exclusion of all other political parties in South-West Africa. This affirmation was made despite the fact that SWAPO is predominantly an Ovambo-based group (the Ovambo's are the largest of Namibia's 12 distinct atheir units), and enjoys less than half of the support of the Ovambo population at that. Still, the U.N.'s Council for Namibia funds a SWAPO office in New York City to the tune of \$185,000 a year.

Given this bias on the East River. it is little wonder that responsible leaders inside Namibia seriously doubt that either the United Nations or the Western powers have the will to bring SWAPO to heel to contest an election fair and square, or that U.N.-supervised elections in Namibia can ever be conducted impartially.

In the past seven months SWAPO "freedom fighters" have backed up their resolve with more than 350 separate acts of violence, from assassinations of chiefs and village leaders to abductions of young schoolchildren to the first-ever bombings in side Windhoek, Namibia.

Weak-willed West

The United Nations, represented by its five Western Security Council members, has been trying to get both South Africa and SWAPO to agree to a formula for free elections and an independence timetable.

Time and time again the Western powers have backed away from firmly negotiated "final" positions, caving in to a succession of SWAPO demands.

The most serious rupture of the 'final'' accord South Africa agreed to in April. 1978, occurred early this year.


Contrary to original agreement SWAPO has presented two new de-mands: 1) that its base camps in neighboring Angola and Zambia not be subjected to U.N. monitoring, and 2) that SWAPO troops be permitted during the cease-fire period to set up (See AFRICA page 6)

AND NOW – CHRIST SETS CHURCH ON **GOD'S ORGANIZATIONAL TRACK**

The following article was sent to the ministry of God's Church in the April 23 Pastor's Report

By Herbert W. Armstrong F or a full year now, the HEAD of God's Church, Jesus Christ, has been moving swiftly to set God's Church, college and Work back on God's track.

WHY did the living Christ 20 months ago bring me back from DEATH? For of a truth, I was as dead as any has ever been - for from 30 seconds up to 11/2 minutes. Had not desperate measures been taken I would never have

taken another breath of air. WHY did Christ, the living HEAD of God's Church, bring me back? I know, now, by what He has done these 20 months. God has a GREAT PURPOSE He is working out here on earth - in and through mortal humans. He works through those He has called and chosen for various responsibilities in His overall PURPOSE

Until about a year ago now, April of last year, I had not yet fully recovered in physical strength to be back on the job full force,

As I now look back, I see what Christ has done through His ser vant whose life and full mental vitality He restored.

This Church was not ready for Christ's soon return as KING of kings to rule. We need to stop and REALIZE THIS!

Read again these significant words: "Christ also loved the church, and give himself for it; That he might sanctify and

cleanse it . That he might present it to himself a GLORIOUS CHURCH, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be HOLY and WITHOUT BLEMISH" (Ephesians 5:25-27).

Fellow ministers of Jesus Christ, this Church a year ago WAS NOT HOLY AND WITHOUT BLEMISH (spiritually speaking, of course).

Then we find, in the not too far distant time from now: "Al-leluia! For the Lord God omnipotent reigneth. Let us be glad and rejoice, and give honour to him: for the MARRIAGE of the Lamb is come, and HIS WIFE HATH MADE HERSELF READY'' (Revelation 19:6-7)

Fellow ministers, God's Church a year ago was FAR from ready for that divine wedding! But as I look back on the past year, the living Jesus Christ has used me as His instrument in swiftly setting His Church back on HIS TRACK. There is much more in prophecy about this, of which I will write later.

Christ is the living HEAD

But too many seem to forget JESUS CHRIST is the LIVING, ACTING HEAD of this Church. We must all quit leaving Christ out of it. But Christ LIVES — and this is NOT just a "work" of men above all, it's not just a "work" I as a human thought up and de-veloped. The living Christ BROUGHT ME BACK TO LIFE! And WHY? What has He been doing, through me? Swiftly He has been TURNING THIS CHURCH AROUND — setting it back on GOD's track, as GOD'S Church NOT MAN'S!

And we needed to be brought closer - every one of us - to GOD in prayer and fasting and in dedication, sacrificing everything from now on, for GOD'S WORK.

God has allowed this massive PERSECUTION by the State of California to drive us to our knees closer to GOD, and bound together CLOSER AMONG OUR-SELVES. Now God allowed the most-listened-to TV program 60 Minutes to attack and malign and FALSELY to represent us to MANY more people than the State of California persecution reached. GOD IS DRAWING US CLOSER TO HIM, AND CLOSER TOGETHER!

And now — Christ is moving me to set His Church on GOD'S organizational structure. For though the Church is NOT a legal corporation, it IS a SPIRITUAL ORGANISM, and that spiritual organism is intended by the mighty GOD to be ORGANIZED - and organized HIS WAY!

Rule from the TOP down

I have realized for 52 years that God's form of government is rule from the TOP down.

In God's rule over the UNIVERSE, we have God at the TOP, and under Him and over all else is CHRIST! But they are DIVINE beings! They are not human or subject to human mistakes. I have had to learn that on the far lower HUMAN plane all is different I made the MISTAKE of thinking

God intended the same form in the HUMAN government over His Church. I was wrong!

You see, Garner Ted Armstrong, my son, was not perfect

like Christ nor I like God. I said to Ted more than once in the past 10 years, "Ted, how wonderful it would be if - as there is a Father and Son over the whole UNIVERSE, there could be also a human father and son'' over God's Church ON EARTH! In their PERFECT divine relationship, the Son does not shut those under Him OFF from the Father - nor does He say it would be taking it over Christ's head if we go direct to the Father (in prayer)."

I mentioned how Jesus said: "I have done nothing of myself. The Father that dwelleth in me, He doeth the works." Jesus taught ONLY what God the Father told Him to teach. He said, "I have not spoken of myself, the Father which sent me, He gave me a commandment what I should speak." Jesus said, "My Father is GREATER than I." He said, "I have kept my Father's com-mandments." Jesus was always in PERFECT HARMONY, and always UNDER His Father.

But every time I mentioned this Father-and-Son harmony, but he has made it perfectly clear since he was excommunicated from God's Church that he NEVER agreed with his father and that means in regard to many, many beliefs and doctrines.

You see, God's Church in our time was founded, and built, on the teachings and doctrines that the living Christ had taught me. Chain of authority

I had God the Father at the top — top in authority, then Christ next under God Then, on the human plane myself under Christ, and Garner Ted under Christ, and Garner red under me — with departments such as Mail Processing, Financial Affairs, Ambassador College, CAD, as we used to call it, etc., etc., under Ted.

What was wRONG with that diagram and form of Church or-ganization? It allowed Ted to simply SHUT OFF myself, Christ and God - all above him, since the diagram showed all else under Ted. Now I had MEANT IT to represent that all departments were under ME and under CHRIST and under GOD. But Ted didn't see it the way I did, or administer it the way I au-thorized. He took ALL power to thorized. He took ALL power to himself. The men in the top posi-tions, such as Mr. Roderick Meredith, Mr. Raymond (See AND NOW, page 4)

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McNair, Dr. Herman Hoeh, Dibar Apartian, Norman Smith, Dennis Luker, were either demoted and ridiculed or shanghaied away to some other part of the earth. Ted surrounded himself with a small group with whom he felt comfortable

But, even though a Fatherand-Son relationship does work PERFECTLY on the divine level, it did not and I think now that God knew it NEVER WOULD work out harmoniously on the human level.

I have not made a whole lot of mistakes - but I stand on record that when mistakes are brought tomy mind, I do CORRECT THEM! And I fervently hope each of you do the same

But when I look into the Bible to see how God organized His Church on the HUMAN level. I find something altogether DIFFERENT than the divine level.

God does not change

In Acts 7:38 ancient Israel under Moses was called "the church in the wilderness." A change was made in the Church from physical to spiritual from carnality to Spirit-mindedness. But GOD does not change, nor His form of human governmental organization.

So. start with the beginning of the Church. God put MOSES as human leader. Who was second in command? Ah! We may look in vain - but NOBODY was sec ond in command, and over all Israel, except Moses!

Did the people say, when Moses was 87 years old, "We must vote for someone to take his place, for Moses is certain to die in the next day or two''? No, Moses did not die at 87 and even married again. The point I wish to make. and hope ALL OF YOU GET THE POINT, is. Moses did not die until the mission to which God called him was completed! And as far as I know, God has not let ANY servant of His, whom He had called for some special service, die before his mission was completed! God hasn't changed. But even if God had changed, and I should die -- as I'm sure my son and some others have eagerly hoped, wHO would head the Church? I'll tell you who! JESUS CHRIST! He isn't going to die right away.

Do you have someone in mind you'd like to see take that job? FORGET IT! Get your mind off of human mundane thoughts! Put JESUS CHRIST back into your thinking! Remember HE is ALLYE and HEADING THIS CHURCH! Whether I, or someone else, is to be the human leader of this Church one, two, five or even 10 years from now - THAT IS FOR JESUS CHRIST to decide - NOT YOU

No second in command

But let's carry on. Maybe God changed a little later? GOD appointed Joshua to lead Israel across Jordan into the promise land. THERE WAS NO NO. 2 MAN! Later God raised up judges, or heroes, to deliver Israel from being a vassal state — yet NO No. 2 in charge!

Then we come to the prophets Eli and Samuel, NO No. 2! The people wanted a HUMAN king instead of God. They had Saul but no second in command. David attended to Saul, played the harp for him - but he was not second IN COMMAND! Next GOD put David on the throne - but NONE SECOND IN AUTHORITY. Two of David's sons tried to take over just as I had a son who did ----but they lost their lives.

There was no second in command under Solomon nor under Rehoboam. Thereafter both Israel and Judah became captive nations.

There was no second in command under Jesus when He was on earth. A disputed point by some is that after Jesus' resurrection and ascension, all 12 apostles were equal. I have PROVED Peter was in charge - and there was no second in command. Paul was in charge over gentiles.

NOTICE! On the day of Pentecost, Peter spoke with AU-THORITY (Acts 2:14-39). But even before that Peter was leader (Acts 1:15). Peter was leader (Acts 3:4 and on). In Acts 4:8 Peter was the leader. Peter was in authority. In Acts 5:3 Peter was IN CHARGE! In Acts 5:15 it was PETER'S SHADOW that healed the sick. In Acts 5:29 PETER was the spokesman of the apostles saying we should OBEY GOD rather than human government. Much of chapter 6 and all of the very long chapter 7 is filled with the story of Stephen.

In Acts 8:20 Peter rebuked the first pope. In Acts 9:32-34 Peter the leader in a healing. In was Acts 9:39-40 Peter raised Dorcus from the dead. In Acts 10 it was PETER whom Christ chose of all the apostles to first carry salvation to the gentiles. In Acts 11 it was PETER who explained to the other apostles how God had opened salvation to gentiles.

In Acts 12, when the Roman ruler and king, Herod, saw it would please the Jews to put an apostle in prison, he knew PETER was the leader, and so put him in prison. Beginning Acts 13 the history turns primarily to the gentiles, and the apostle Paul is shown to be the leader. But in Acts 15, as I have explained in detail before, at the meeting of apostles and evangelists lerusalem, it was PETER who settled the question, which James merely affirmed and made official, because he was pastor of the local, but headquarters church at Jerusalem.

In Galatians 1:18 Paul went up to Jerusalem to see PETER, be-cause Peter had leadership over the people of Israel as Paul over the gentiles. In Galatians 2:8 Paul shows that Peter had primacy in the apostleship to the circumcision as Paul had to the gentiles. GOD, in ruling among humans, HAS ALWAYS WORKED THROUGH ONE MAN AT A TIME - NEVER TWO MEN - NEVER ONE HAVING COMPLETE AUTHORITY UNDER THE TOP HUMAN IN AUTHORITY

NEVER BY COMMITTEES OR GROUPS! Always that one man is CHOSEN BY CHRIST - never by PEOPLE

God's form of government

And so, God's form of GOVERNMENT in His Church is. first, at the top in supreme authority, GOD the Father, Under Him, Christ, to whom the Father has delegated ALSO TOTAL AU-THORITY (as He never does to any HUMAN). Then, on the earthly human level Christ's chosen APOSTLE, and, under him on a straight and equal line (no one over another), these department heads: Mail Processing, Buildings & Grounds, Ambassador College, Financial Affairs, Plain Truth Editorial Production, Plain Truth Mechanical Production Pastoral Administration, Festival Office, Television and Radio Production, Bible Correspondence Course, Good News and Worldwide News Production. etc.

Each of these under the apostle. No one of these over any other. But, IF each department head will DAILY, CONSTANTLY keep the living Jesus CHRIST in his mind and heart, I'm sure there will be harmony. The press has called us the

"BELEAGUERED WORLDWIDE CHURCH OF GOD." WHY? We do not have power struggles, envies, competition, jealousies, between one LAY MEMBER and the others All this "BELEACUEREDNESS" has originated on the fourth floor of the Hall of Administration! State of California's suit against Church

The following is a reprint of the original suit filed Jan. 2 against the Worldwide Church of God, its leaders and related institutions by the State of California Attorney General's Office.

SUPERIOR COURT OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA FOR THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES

The People of the State of California, ex rel. Alvin Earl Timmons, Shirley A. Timmons, David R. Morgan, John Tuit, Paula Tuit and Ronald Quinlan, Plaintiff; vs. Worldwide Church of God, Inc., a California corporation, Ambassador College, Inc., a California corpora-tion, Ambassador International Cultural Foundation, Inc., a California corporation, Wilshire Travel Inc. corporation, Wilshire Travel, Inc., a California corporation, Worldwide Advertising, Inc., a California cor-poration, Gateway Publishing, Inc., a California corporation, Environ-mental Plastics, Inc., a Texas corporation qualified to do business in California, Herbert W. Armstrong, Stanley R. Rader, Osamu Gotoh, Robert Kuhn, Raymond L. Wright, Henry Cornwall, Ralph Helge, the accounting firm of Rader, Cornwall and Kessler, and DOEs 1 through 100, inclusive, Defendants. Case No. C-267607. Complaint

for: (a) accounting, (b) removal of existing directors of a nonprofit corporation and appointment of properly selected new directors, (c) appointment of a receiver, and (d) injunctive and other appropriate relief. Plaintiff complains of defendants.

and for a first cause of action against

them alleges as follows: FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION (FOR

ACCOUNTING): 1. This action is brought by and on behalf of the People of the State of California, acting on the relation of the individuals named above,

2. Each of the relators is now and at all time pertinent to this action; has been a member of the defendant Worldwide Church of God, Inc.; and each has tithed (i.e., given at least 10 percent of his net income each year) to the Church for all or most of that

3. Defendants Worldwide Church of God, Inc.; Ambassador College, Inc.; and Ambassador International Cultural Foundation, Inc.; are each California corporations, organized and existing exclusively for charitable, religious and educational purposes. All have their principal offices at the same location in the city of Pasadena, county of Los Angeles; they have many officers and directors in common, and are under common control; and they are part of a single charitable, religious and educational organization ("the Church"). All of their funds, property and assets are derived from charitable contributions

and are held in public trust. 4. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and on that basis alleges, that each of the other defendant corporations is owned or controlled by one or more of the officers or directors of the Church, the college or the foundation, including particularly the de-fendant Stanley R. Rader; and that funds and property contributed to the Church are freely transferred among the Church and the other corporate defendants; and that the unity of rec-ord ownership and actual control among the Church and the other corporate defendants, and the course of dealing between them, has been for many years and is now such that for all purposes of this action, it would all purposes or this action, it would be unjust and inequitable to recog-nize any separate existence among them at all. The exact status and constitution of the other corporate de-fendants, and their precise relation-

ship with the Church, are matters not known to plaintiff at this time, but are peculiarly within the knowledge of the defendants; but plaintiff will ask leave of the Court to amend this Complaint to show their true status and constitution, and the exact nature of their relations with the Church, when the same have been ascer-

5. All of the individual named defendants are either officers, directors or full-time employees of the Church or of one or more of the named corporate defendants, and all the acts herein complained of have been done with their knowledge and complicity and under their supervision.

6. Defendants HEPPERT ARMSTRONG and STANLEY R. RADER are and at all times pertinent to this Complaint have been in full and complete control of the Church and a11 all its affairs. HERBERT W. ARMSTRONG is and has been ever since the formation of Worldwide Church of God, Inc., pastor general of the Church, and STANLEY R. RADER is treasurer and general coun-sel of the Worldwide Church of God, Inc., and both men are officers and directors of one or more of the named corporate defendants.

7. Plaintiff is informed and be lieves, and on that basis alleges, that each of the defendants DOE is, and at all times pertinent to this action has been, either the record owner of a substantial interest in, or a director or officer of, one or more of the corpo-rate defendants, or an agent of the other defendants acting with respect to all the acts herein complained of within the course and scope of said agency. The true names and capacities of the said defendants DOE (whether individual, corporate, as sociate or otherwise) and the true na-ture of their relationship with the other defendants, is presently un-known to the plaintiff, but is peculiarly within the knowledge of the individual named defendants. Plaintiff will ask leave of the Court to amend this Complaint to show the true names and capacities of the defendants DOE, and the true nature of their relation ship, when the same have been ascer tained.

8. The Church and its officers, and particularly the defendants ARM-STRONG and RADER, are required by law to account to its members for all funds received, expended or held by the Church. Notwithstanding this duty to account, and not withstanding the fact that many of its members have frequently requested an ac-counting, the defendants have failed and refused, and still fail and refuse, to make any such accounting at all.

9. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and on that basis alleges, that between January 1, 1975, and the present date, the named individual defendants, acting in concert with and under the direction of defendants ARMSTRONG and RADER, have been and are siphoning off the property and assets of the Church and appropriating them to their own personal use and benefit, on a massive scale amounting to several million dollars per year. Plaintiff is furthermore informed and believes, and therefore alleges, that said siphoning and mis-appropriation has resulted and continues to result in substantial fiscal deficits from operations of the Church, which would otherwise have an excess of revenues over expendi ture

10. Because the named individual defendants are now, and at all times pertinent to this action have been in full, effective and exclusive control of all the property, assets, records and administrative facilities of the

Church; and because they have con-sistently denied and still presently deny to all members of the Church meaningful access to the records aforesaid, plaintiff has no alternative but to make many of the allegations of this complaint on information and belief. Plaintiff will ask leave of the Court to amend this complaint in all pertinent respects when the particular facts concerning the actions complained of have been ascertained.

Plaintiff complains of defendants, and for a second cause of action against them alleges as follows:

SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION (FOR REMOVAL OF EXISTING DIRECTORS AND APPOINTMENT OF PROPERLY SELECTED NEW DIRECTORS):

11. Paragraphs 1 through 10 of the First Cause of Action are incorporated by reference into and hereby made a part of this Second Cause of Action

12. Defendants are required by law to hold regular meetings of the members of the defendant corporations and to allow the members of said corporations to vote on various matters affecting the governance of the defendant Church, including the election of directors to the boards of directors of said corporations. Each of the defendant corporations is furthermore required to submit certain of its actions to the vote of its board of directors before taking such actions, all as provided by law

13. The defendants have failed and fused, and still fail and refuse to refused. call or hold any elections whatsoe among the members, or to allow the members of the defendant corporations to vote on any matter affecting Church governance or its business or financial affairs whatsoever. Moreover, plaintiff is informed and believes, and therefore alleges, that none of the directors of the aforesaid corporations actually votes on any matters affecting Church governance; but instead merely acquiesces in decisions and instruction made by the defendants ARMSTRONG and RADER.

Plaintiff complains of defendants, and for a third cause of action against them alleges as follows:

THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION (RECEIVER): 14. Paragraphs 1 through 10 of the

First Cause of Action, and Para-graphs 12 and 13 of the Second Cause of Action, are hereby incorporated by reference into and made a part of this Third Cause of Action.

15. Based on limited and sporadic 15. Based on inflict and sporade, statements issued by defendants to the membership of the Church, plaintiff is informed and believes, and on that basis alleges, that the Church receives approximately \$70 million per year in contributions, and that it as a net worth of approximately \$80 million. Most of its net worth is held in the form of real estate.

16. Plaintiff is informed and be lives, and on that basis alleges, that between January 1, 1975, and the present date, the Church spent and continues to spend at least \$1 million more each year than it receives in contributions and, for that reason, has been forced to liquidate some of its holdings in order to defray its cur rent expenditures. All the excess of expenditures over receipts is attributable to the individual defendants' pil-fering of the revenues of the Church and their appropriation of its assets to their own personal use and benefit, which pilfering and appropriation continues to this very day on a mas-sive scale. So long as the individual named defendants, and particularly defendants HERBERT W. ARMSTRON and STANLEY R. RADER remain in full, effective and exclusive control

of the business affairs of the Church. they alone will continue in the future, as they have in the past, to determine the nature and extent of all its expenditures

17. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and on that basis alleges: that during the last six months, as part of their program of appropriating the assets of the Church to their own use and in order to facilitate said appropriation, the individual defendants have been liquidating the properties of the Church on a massive scale; and that in Southern California alone, some 50 parcels of property belong ing to the Church have been sold in the last six months, many of them at prices well below their market value

Plaintiff is further informed and believes, and on that basis al-leges: that one of the largest properties of the Church is a 1,600-acre parcel in Big Sandy, Texas, which includes a college campus and associated buildings, and which is worth \$30 million; yet the individual defendants have caused the Church to enter into an agreement to sell the aforementioned parcel to a third party for approximately \$10 million; and these defendants have attempted to conceal from the members of the Church the true worth of the Big Sandy property, and have instead published false statements, known by them to be false, to the effect that the property aforesaid is worth only about \$8 million. All these statements and activities are part of their effort to convert the assets of the Church into a form in which they may be more easily appropriated to the personal use and benefit of the individual defendants.

1.8. Plaintiff is further informed and believes, and therefore alleges, that the individual named defendants, in an effort to frustrate discov ery of their wrongdoing and to ob-scure the facts, have caused and are causing the written records of the de-fendant corporations and to be shredded and destroyed; and that if said removal and destruction are allowed to continue, it may never be possible to develop a true and complete ac-counting of the Church finances dur-ing the time period complained of.

19. The appointment of a receiver pendente lite is necessary forthwith to prevent the continued appropria-tion of Church funds and assets to the personal use and benefit of the indi-vidual defendants; to halt the imminent and massive selling-off of valu-able Church properties at prices well below their market value; and to prevent the further destruction Church records; and to conduct an independent investigation of claims which the Church may have against the individual named defendants and others, and thereafter to file and pursue such suits and actions on behalf of the Church as may be appropriate.

Plaintiff complains of defendants, and for a Fourth Cause of Action against them, alleges as follows:

FOURTH CAUSE OF ACTION (INJUNCTIVE RELIEF):

20. Paragraphs 1 through 10 of the First Cause of Action, 12 and 13 of the Second Cause of Action, and 15 through 19 of the Third Cause of Action, are hereby incorporated into and made a part of this Fourth Cause

of Action. 21. The receiver will require access to the books and records, and to the administrative facilities, of the Church, in order to discharge his duties, and in order to protect and preserve the assets of the Church pendente lite; but the individual named defendants threaten to deny such access to any person other than themselves and have demonstrated

an intention to remove and destroy said books, records and facilities rather than to let any other person see them; and unless enjoined and restrained from doing so by this Court, they will do so and will not yield up the said assets and records to the re ceiver

22. The individual named defendants are engaged in an ongoing pro-gram of liquidation of Church assets and have already entered into agree-ments to sell many of said properties at prices well below their market value; and unless they and those with whom they deal are enjoined and restrained from doing so by this Court, they will sell, transfer, mortgage and encumber said properties. WHEREFORE PLAINTIFF PRAYS:

1. For an order requiring defendants to make a full and complete accounting to this Court and to the members of the Church of the affairs of the Worldwide Church of God. Inc., Ambassador College, Inc., Ambassador International Cultural Foundation, Inc., Excelsior Leasing, Inc., Mid-Atlantic Leasing, Inc., Wilshire Travel, Inc., Environmen-tal Plastics, Inc., Gateway Publish-ing, Inc., Worldwide Advertising, Inc., and the accounting firm of Rader, Cornwall and Kessler, from at least January 1, 1975, or such ear lier date as may be appropriate, through the date of said.accounting.

2. For an order requiring an immediate election of new directors for Worldwide Church of God, Inc., Worldwide Church of God, Inc., Ambassador College, Inc., and Am-bassador International Cultural Foundation, Inc., and requiring all of said new directors to be elected by the members of the Church according to the procedures prescribed by law.

3. For an order appointing a temporary receiver ex parte, and a re-ceiver pendente lite to take posses-sion, until further order of this Court, of all the property of the defendant corporations aforesaid, and of their books and records, and empowering him to take such actions as he deems in the reasonable exercise of his discretion, appropriate to recover property and assets wrongfully taken from the Church, and to prevent the further dissipation of Church prop-erty and assets, said power to include without limitation the power to bring lawsuits in the name of the Church of any of its affiliated organizations, and to retain independent accountants, lawyers and other professional assistants to assist him in the prosecu-tion of such lawsuits.

4. For an injunction restraining the named individual defendants, their agents, employees and all persons acting in concert with them from interfering in any way with the actions of said receiver, and requiring them furthermore to yield up to said re-ceiver all the books, records and ad-ministrative facilities of said corporate defendants.

5. For an injunction restraining the named individual defendants, their agents, employees and all persons acting in concert with them from selling or mortgaging or asserting own-ership in any other way over the property or assets of any of the corporate defendants, except as the courtappointed receiver may allow

For costs of suit herein.
For such other and different or

further relief as to this Court may seem just and proper. DATED: January 2, 1979

or their families were injured. Mr. Carley described the disaster area in Wichita Falls: "You go in the area, and you get the feeling you are in a war situation. They have the 'battle lines' and emergency relief, the

Red Cross, and you hear sirens going off every time you go out there. There are guards all over the place. "It's unbelievable," Mr. Carley continued, "it looks like the place has been bombed for about 24 hours

Not just another storm

Jerry McGee's wife and three young sons stayed with his wife's parents that stormy evening while he listened to weather reports on his car radio on the way to services in Law 'I never dreamed my area (in Wichita Falls) was being hit. I thought it was just another spring storm," Mr. McGee said.

The McGees had to move out of their heavily damaged home, still standing with its windows blown out and a garage wall missing. But Mr. McGee is thankful. "Even when you see it all day long, you can't imagine you're in something like that. We've got a lot to be thankful for. All I have to do is to look around at the damage the neighbors got," Mr. McGee said.


In his immediate area, the tornado dropped again, shredding homes

until, about two blocks away from the McGees, it bounced over the home of Jeff and Betty Puckett. Mrs Puckett was also on her way to Passover services. Mr. Puckett was in the home, but escaped serious injury. Although there is a large hole in the Pucketts' back bedroom wall, the home is repairable.

Don Eubanks, a member in the same area, interviewed Mr. and Mrs. Jaime Calderon, whose home was almost totally demolished by the storm. Rose Calderon had left home about a quarter till six to attend ser-vices, but heavy rain along her route forced her to turn back. By the time she returned to Wichita Falls, it was dark. And to her dismay, it looked as if there were no houses left standing. "We didn't know which way to

turn. We didn't know what street was what. I was scared, but I really didn't believe that the kids were harmed," Mrs. Calderon said. She learned that her daughter Evette had called her teenage brother from work to warn him to get in a closet for protection. The storm hit just as he entered the closet. After the noise of the wind, punctuated by shattering glass, sub-sided, the Calderons' son left his closet uninjured to look with amazement at the devastation surrounding him.

Mrs. F.E. Chadwell's home in Wichita Falls was destroyed, only the walls left standing, while she was away at Passover services. The home of Mr. and Mrs. Grant Adkins was also destroyed. While Margaret Adkins was on her way to services, her husband hid in the bathroom of their

Mr. Carley reports that those needing temporary homes have now been relocated and others affected by the storms have been taken care of. He expressed his appreciation for the concern shown by many brethren who have called and offered aid to the storm victims.

Mississippi floods

While people were assaying the mado damage in Texas and Oklatornado home, floodwaters were rushing through the streets of Jackson, Miss., April 15, forcing thousands to evacuate their homes in an attempt to escape what city officials describe as the worst flood in Jackson's history.

The Worldwide News contacted Robert Peoples, pastor of the Jackson church, April 17, to learn how the flood affected Church members in that area. Mr. Peoples reported: 'As far as our Church people

here, we haven't really had any prob-

lems. Most of our people are not in the flood area. Only one man who's in the Church, that I've heard of, has had some water in his home. We're just very thankful. It's a disaster in other parts of Jackson." Mr. Peoples lives in the southwest area of Jackson, which was relatively unaffected

by the flood. Holy Day services also took place in this section of the city

Mr. Peoples said he planned to ask Church members to collect canned food to aid those victims of the flood. He concluded: "We've been very fortunate. I'm sure God has seen fit to protect us."

Ierusalem to be Feast site.

PASADENA - The Feast of Tabernacles will be observed in Jerusalem again this year, the Festi-val Office here announced. Jerusalem Feastgoers' itinerary in-cludes a 12-day tour of the Holy Land that will feature such sites as the Mount of Olives, Golgotha and the Garden Tomb, Meggido (Armageddon, Revelation 16:16), the Temple Mount and other biblical sites. Free days in the tour schedule are

also planned. There will be an on tional excursion to the Rose Red City in Petra, Jordon, dependant on the political situation.

The tour will be limited to 300 people because of the number of housing accommodations available at that time of year. Reservations will be on a first-come first-served basis. Tour rates will range from \$1,039

to \$1,199 for economy, depending on point of departure, or from \$1,239 to \$1,399 for standard rates. (Low figures are from New York, high from Los Angeles, Calif.). For an additional \$75 a person there will also be an optional two-night stay in London, the gathering location for all who will be going on the tour, ac-cording to the Festival Office.

(Continued from page 2) five military bases within Namibia itself.

The U.N. plan simply ushers the fox into the hen house. Neither Angola nor Zambia is in complete con-trol of its own territory. Even if they wanted to, they couldn't monitor the SWAPO forces. And on the second point, because SWAPO guerrillas presently have no bases in Namibia proper, the U.N. plan would give them on a silver platter what they have always lacked. During the cease-fire, with South African troops confined to their bases, the SWAPO command would massively infil trate all of its externally provided bases

The new Western-sponsored U.N. plan, according to the Sunday Times of Johannesburg, "would not only give SWAPO the fruits of a military victory, which it has been unable to win, but it would skew hopelessly the results of the election as voters ob-served SWAPO forces moving in, under U.N. protection, to replace the departing South Africans.

Can't run away

Perhaps the West feels it can comfortably disengage itself from the impending disaster it is helping to create. That's foolish thinking. editorialized another Johannesburg daily, the Afrikaans-language Beeld. The West, it said, simply "will not be able to run away" from its "dis-honest and cowardly game of concessions . . . The Communists and Africa will not allow that."

Plan ahead to make Feast more enjoyable

By James Capo PASADENA — Time to plan for the 1979 Feast of Tabernacles is now. Receivership has caused many delays for the Festival Department this year, said Budde Marino, public relations director for the Festival Office, and the help of all the brethren is needed for prompt and efficient processing of applications.

This year all applications must go to Tucson, Ariz., for processing fi-nancially before being sent to Pasadena for coordinating purposes, so brethren are urged to solidify Fes-tival plans well in advance of the June 30 deadline.

Early planning encouraged

Don't wait until you receive your application, start planning early so that when your application arrives it can be completed and mailed to Tucson without delay, Mr. Marino suggests. Even if you are not able to attend the Feast this year, the Festival Department needs this statistical in-

Those wishing to share accommodations or to be assigned to the same establishment must send in their applications, stapled together, in the same envelope with one \$35 deposit per application. Jack McKinney, Festival accommodations direct advises that plans be made together and one party be designated to send in all applications and deposits, even if the sharing parties live hundreds of miles apart.

"Th Festival Office will not be able to match up parties who apply separately," he said. Applications separately, ne said. Approximately sent in separately must be returned, requiring extra labor and paperwork, so brethren can aid the Work by getting together on their Festival pla

Camping facilities will be sharnly reduced this year because of the loss of Big Sandy, Tex., as a Feast site. While this year's only new site, Biloxi, Miss., has ample space for

The second second second

vehicular camping (space for tents is limited), and other locations are increasing their camping facilities for both vehicles and tents, they will not be able to replace the 5,000 spaces once available at Big Sandy. Mr. McKinney said it would be advisable for those who do not need to camp to make other arrangements, so space will be available for those who have to camp.

For those people, camping reser-vations will be handled by the Festival Office for all areas except Fresno, Calif., Savannah, Ga., Seattle, Wash., Saratoga Springs, N.Y., and Norfolk, Va. Personal arrangements can be made to camp at those sites, and a \$35 deposit is not required for those making their own arrangements

International transfers

A deposit is also not required for those requesting an international transfer. Check with your Festival adviser for a list of international sites. After you receive your Fes-tival application the Festival Office asks that the following procedures be followed when a request for a trans-fer to an international Feast site is submitted. (The same procedures apply when requesting a transfer to Alaska.)

· Applicant should specifically designate international site desired. In countries with more than one site, please indicate exact location of requested transfer. • Application is to be returned in

envelope provided. Mail to: Herbert W. Armstrong, Box 431, Tucson, Ariz., 85702.

• As mentioned above, do not send a \$35 deposit. Some interna-tional sites will require a housing de-posit. These amounts vary from site to site and will be handled by the international coordinator for that site upon transfer approval.

• The Festival Office then copies the application and mails the original

to the international site requested • The international coordinator for each site approves or disapproves

each U.S. request and sends related information to the member.

 Applicant notifies international coordinator if any change or cancel-lation is necessary. If change or can-cellation is made prior to Sept. 1, the Festival Office must also be notified. If after this date, simply attend the continental site that you would normally be assigned to, and apply for accommodations at the housing of-fice on-site.

• The applicant is responsible for all travel/transportation arrangements before, during and after the Feast. If the international coordinator for your approved transfer site cannot answer all your questions, a travel agency should be able to help you

If second-tithe assistance is needed, your minister should be consulted. The special assistance form he will provide should be returned to your minister with your application. He will send them in the same envelope to the Festival Office. Please

do not send either form in yourself. The Festival Office stressed that the cooperation of the brethren is needed more this year than ever be-fore. By being prompt and by follow-ing the application instructions carefully, you can help make this the most rewarding, trouble-free and profitable Feast ever. So plan early for a great Feast.

New 1979 U.S. Feast site offers historical past, coastal activities

By Ken Tate PASADENA — Biloxi, Miss., will be the only new site in the conti-nental United States for the 1979 Feast of Tabernacles said Sherwin McMichael, director of the Festival Office here. The area of Biloxi and Gulfport,

I he area of Biloxi and Gulfport, Miss., described as "Mid-America's closest and most easily reached sea-coast area," basks in the warm cli-mate of the Mississippi Gulf Coast. The region abounds with activities both seaward and inland combining a historic past with a modern present.

Festival activities will take place in the Mississippi Coast Coliseum and Convention Center, referred to by Mr. McMichael as "one of the finest auditoriums we will be in this year.

(Incidentally, for those wishing to get a glimpse of the coliseum, it will be the site of the nationally televised Miss America Pageant, scheduled April 30.)

April 30.) The facility includes an arena seat-ing up to 12,000, an adjacent 70,000-square-foot exhibition and banquet hall and parking for 3,000 cars. The convention center looks out upon the beautiful Gulf Coast beach just a stone's throw away.

White sand beaches

The area boasts 26 miles of white sand beaches perfect for sun

ning in weather that normally tops at about 80 degrees during October. Attractions include a marine-life show, fishing piers, many historic buildings and sites, arcades for the kids and in nearby Ocean Springs,

Miss., a pottery works that features tours through its facilities. A short distance from the conven

tion center is a large shopping mall with more than 125 stores able to supply virtually all the needs of Feastgoers. At Biloxi harbor a small tour train

At Biloxi harbor a small tour train shuttles visitors along a route that includes many of the points of in-terest in the vicinity. Also, the Biloxi Chamber of Commerce sponsors a self-guided walking tour of the downtown area. Some of the interesting historic

sites include Beauvoir, the last home of Jefferson Davis, the only president of the Confederacy during the Civil War. The buildings of Beauvoir also house the Jefferson Davis shrine and museum.

The Tulis-Toledano manor, built in 1856, is the summer mansion of Mississippi's governor. A special tour or individual admission to the museum is available.

The Biloxi lighthouse, with the exception of a brief period during the Civil War, has been in continuous operation since its completion in May, 1848. Unchanged except for the installation of electricity in 1929,

the lighthouse was the first cast-iron tower to be erected in the South. It is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

Biloxi is located between New Orleans, La., 85 miles to the west, and Mobile, Ala., 60 miles to the east, opening the way to afternoon excur-

opening the way to atternoon excur-sions to those cities during the Feast. To the north, 34 miles from Gulf-port, is the small Mississippi town of Wiggins, where Herbert W. Arm-strong worked at a lumber mill in his younger years.

Founded by the French

Biloxi was established in 1720 as a relocation of the Biloxi Bay colony (previously in the Ocean Springs area). The colony was founded by French explorer Pierre d'Iberville while under commission of the king of France. The town served as capital of the Louisiana territory from 1720 until 1723.

Despite both English and Spanish rule, Biloxi remained essentially French until 1811 when the Mississippi territory was added to America. Many residents are French descendants, and the area still retains a French flavor. Economically, the area is sup-

ported primarily by tourism and the seafood industry. The seafood industry is tied to the

principal avenue of entertainment and enjoyment, the Gulf of Mexico.

Charter a boat


Another way to enjoy the gulf is to charter a sailboat. Almost any size sailboat is available, from a small

catamaran to a sailing yacht. A particularly interesting trip is from the harbor to Ship Island aboard an excursion boat. Seagulls dive for food thrown from the boat during the

trip, delighting the children. Ship Island served as a strategic site during the Civil War and is the site of historic Ft. Massachusetts, now a na-tional park. At the island, park rangers give tours of the fort and recount its history. Visitors may swim, sun-bathe or fish along seven miles of beautiful beaches. On the return trip one may view a gulf sunset.

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one may view a guit sunset. Biloxi combines the beauty of the Gulf Coast with a small city envi-ronment. A smaller version of the popular St. Petersburg, Fla., site, Biloxi is an interesting, entertaining and advantional lowering. Excelution and educational location for the 1970 Feast of Tabernacles



This issue's "Forum" is the result of a question-andanswer session held by Stanley R. Rader, the Work's treasurer and general counsel to Herbert W. Armstrong, in Pasadena April 19. Mr. Rader's comments cover various aspects of the present state of the Church, particularly questions generated by a report on the Church April 15 on 60 Minutes, a network television program.

How many of you saw 60 Minutes? That's pretty good. Let's see how many didn't see it? Quite a few. I think the television people could probably remedy that. Is there something that we can do — someone here from Television Department — could make it available to people? Is it possible that they could see it — those that would be interested? Good. Let's do that.

Mr. Armstrong has already addressed himself specifically to the 60 Minutes program in a letter that's already been mailed. And as usual, 1 will not preempt him in any way. L think you will be very interested in reading what he has had to say about Mr. [Mike] Wallace. And he has his inimitable way of dealing with people like that, and the mail should bring his letter to you. I would imagine, tomorrow or Saturday at the latest.

I, however, wanted to address myself to a specific aspect of the 60 Minutes program. And in order to help you to better understand all aspects of the problem. I have prepared a fivepage commentary, which I think is important for all of you to read. It will be published in *The Worldwide News* and probably the *Pastor's Report*. For those of you who would like to pick up a copy before that, I've made arrangements with Mr. Kevin Dean for you to do so.

Kevin Dean for you to do so. I think I will read from it, pause from time to time and comment parenthetically, and then answer questions from any of you concerning the subject matter discussed, and/or any other questions you might have at this time.

might have at this time. Those of you who did see last Sunday's 60 Minutes segment relating to the Church may remember Mike Wallace's so-called tag line in which he stated that I was 'under investigation' by the Internal Revenue Service for criminal tax evasion. This statement was no doubt intended to somehow bolster the thrust both expressed and implied of the segment, namely that there is some merit to the patently ridiculous charges made against the Church, Mr. Armstrong, myself and tothers by the State Attorney General, George Deutmejian.

My purpose today is not to refute, to deny or to disprove either the charges made by the attorney general or the charges of tax evasion made against me, all of which. I assure you, are absolutely false. Rather, my purpose here is to simply share my feelings and perceptions with you, and, with your aid, to identify the lessons which we and others must learn from the abuse of government power we have been witnessing these past three months and its treatment by the media.

(Yesterday — I'll comment later, by the way — the media has now learned to fear the living God. The Supreme Court put the fear of the living God into the media. They are now crying like stuck pigs, and 60 Minutes is involved. And the case is squarely in point. I'll discuss that later.)

What I find most instructive and revealing about the so-called tag line of Mr. Wallace this I referred to a moment ago, is that which was not said, and more aptly, that which was deliberately left out.

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First, although Mr. Wallace saw fit to tell millions of Americans that the Internal Revenue Service is "investigating" me for "alleged tax evasion," he failed to disclose that I have voluntarily given the Internal Revenue Service complete access to all of my financial records — all of which I had a right by the them way, not to do at all. All I had to do is say no, nothing. The Fifth Amend-ment gives me that right. I chose to waive it. I also gave the Internal Revenue Service my permission, with Mr. [Ralph] Helge's approval and Mr. Armstrong's understanding and approval, to look at the Church's financial records as they pertain to me. Do you all understand that? As they pertain to me and me alone. And that the Internal Revenue Service has indeed been conducting an examina-tion for 21/2 months, but has found no

evidence of any wrongdoing. Moreover, Mr. Wallace also failed to state that the investigation relates in substantial part to several years in which I and the Church were audited and given clean bills of health.

Second, although Mr. Wallace stated that his information regarding his so-called tag line was gathered from his "source," he failed to disclose to the millions of Americans watching either during the main segment, when I asked him, or otherwise, who that source is. I have no doubt in my own mind that the "source" also was responsible for the surreptitious and illegal recording of Mr. Armstrong's telephone conversations, the instigation and initiation of the attorney general's baseless lawsuit, and in initiation of the Internal Revenue Service investigation itself.

By the way, with respect to those illegally obtained and surrepitiously recorded telephone conversations, Mr. Armstrong two months ago filed an affidavit with the district attorney, Mr. [John] Van de Kamp, stating that they were recorded without his permission, and asked the district attorney to prosecute those responsible for it. We have named the person responsible for it, Mr. C. Wayne Cole. Mr. Armstrong labeled him as the person who violated his trust.

We have renewed that effort now with Mr. Van de Kamp. We will also go to the U.S. Attorney's office because it violates not only criminal penal code provisions of the State of California, but also of the United States code — the so-called crime in the, or anticrime in the, streets act. And hopefully the district attorney will not be unwilling to bring pressure to bear on those who have been responsible for this.

And hopefully he will not be unduly impressed by the fact the attorney general has been involved with Mr. Cole and others in illegal activities, because Mr. Wallace had the same stolen documents in his possession when he interviewed me, as has the attorney general.

But in this whole matter, I am reminded, and some of you also will recall, that commencing in 1974 — 1974 — shortly after David Antion and a few others attempted to destroy this Work, that Mr. Armstrong, the Church and I and others, were hounded — hounded — and harassed for three years by the United States

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Every time we landed, it was like a Keystone comedy. Customs agents were crawing all over our plane like ants, allegedly seeking evidence linking the Church and its leaders to the smuggling of drugs, gold, diamonds, precious artworks and the like. When we sought to ascertain through the freedom of information act the identities of the people making these baseless accusations against us, we were told that the law did not permit the disclosure of these sources.

Even after we demonstrated that the charges were false, the government still refused to tell us who had unjustifiably and unjustly subjected us to several years of harassment.

Indeed, it's not unlikely, is it? that the same "source," one or more dissident Church members out to destroy the Church for their own gain, were responsible both for our harassment by the Customs Service and for the instant wholesale State intrusion and even the Internal Revenue Service examination. What lessons should we learn from

what lessons should we learn totin these experiences? That's what you must ask yourself. What lessons? I believe there are basically three lessons. First, as the Watergate episode also teaches us, government officials are capable of monstrous abuses of power in order to oppress those who do not share their beliefs and biases.

Enemy lists whose members are, without just cause, subjected to investigation by the IRS and other agencies, office break-ins, wiretaps. These are not figments of the imagination. They happen every day by governmental officials who abuse the power that an unwitting public gives them.

You've all been reading about some of these illegal searches and seizures lately. Finally, Conrad came out in the [Los Angeles, Calif.] *Times* the other day and showed Deukmeijan for what he is — an animal. The cartoon reached him to the core — all it took. And everyone in this state ought to see just that cartoon. Don't have to see anything more.

How many saw that cartoon? Do you know what I mean? So art, that particular form, is a good one. But that's what I mean by governmental abuse. And those things are not figments of our imagination — breakins, wiretapping, bugging, things of that nature.

How many of you remember [Daniel] Ellsberg at the time of the Watergate affair? They broke into the offices illegally of his doctor. They will go to any extreme to pull themselves up by their bootstraps. Even a U.S federal judge was called to question for talking with people in the White House about a possible appointment to the FBI at the very time the Ellsberg case was before him.

And these things will continue until political and religious freedomare restored in the country. There's no question about that. And without political freedom, you don't have any religious freedoms. And that's the price which you. Mr. Armstrong and land others must be willing to pay for doing God's Wort. We're going to be subjected to oppression as long as we do not agree with the beliefs and biases of some of these politicians.

Some people have told me that Mr. Deukmejian is merely a dupe. Others have told me he just ind 'very bright. Others have told me he just doesn't know what's going on in his own offices in the Los Angeles area. Others have told me that he hasn't been in office long enough to find out what's going on in the Los Angeles area. Others have told me that he can't get control of bureaucrats in the office. He inherits them, and he has to go along with what they have in mind.

I say to you he has the mentality of a policeman. If he wanted to be chief

of police, he should have gone to Long Beach and run for chief of police. And I say the time to nip a tyrant is in the bud. We heard things like that about Hitler, if you read it carefully. Nobody took him seriously in 1933. A lot of people didn't even take him seriously in 1941. This man has the mentality of a

This man has the mentality of a man who wears the jackboot. He defends everything that happens that is wrong because it satisfies his perception, which is, he has taken a prosecutorial approach. He sits up there, and he decides who's good and who's bad. And then he tries to prove that somehody is had.

It's like Mr. Helge said. A plaintiff comes into court and says: "1 suffered an automobile injury. 1'm going to sue X. I don't know whether * even has a car, I don't know whether he drives, I don't know what Mr. Deukmejian's approach is, and that's evil. Make no mistake about that. It's evil.

We must fight against oppression. We must fight against oppression. We must bear it, however, with pride, while we carry out God's will, and I bear this oppression as does Mr. Armstrong with pride. And every now and then somebody in the news media, and maybe some of our dissenters will interpret that as arrogance. Well, it's not arrogance, but it is pride.

it is pride. I learned from Mr. Armstrong at his feet because I was his servant 365 days a year for more than 10 years, and he told me that we would be persecuted just as Christ was. And so I bear that persecution, as does he, with pride. And if the news media considers it arrogance, so be it, because I know we will prevail even against the gates of hell. There is no question about that. So let them do what they may, we will prevail. But let's remember that governit.

But let's remember that governmental officials abuse the power with which they are entrusted. Why do they do this? They do it in order to make names for themselves. They do it to procure larger budget appropriations. They do it to gain other political objectives. And as a consequence, they frequently act precipitously just as the Customs Service did.

Can any of you really imagine this? For three years we were chased around this world. It was like literally — have any of you ever seen a Keystone comedy? That's what it was. And they never found a thing. But they acted on "information" and specious claims of people that can only be characterized as venomous vipers without any independent investigation or corroboration of those claims.

That is a pity because I say you can take a look first, you can take a measure of the credibility of the people that are so-called "informers," and you can do something before you act precipitously and brand Mr. Armstrong and brand me as having pilfered and siphoned millions of dollars every year.

It's ludicrous if it weren't so tragic. And to facilitate these attempts, the politicians keep the identities of the real accusers secret lest the innocent victim confront them, and in doing so, expose the politicians as charlatans, because that's what politicians are, charlatans.

Have you ever read anything by H.L. Mencken? Find him. It's good reading over some Sunday. He'll tell you about politicians. He'll tell you what they say as compared to what they do. He's dead now. He died about 1948. But he wrote much about the American language and the American scene. But his favorite topic was the American politician, the benefactor of the public good, the benefactor. my benefactor.

How many of you look upon the

politician as a benefactor? You do? You're entitled.

Finally, in its own inimitable way, the media frequently is, sometimes unwittingly, but more often than not intentionally, the primary instrument of oppression. Its cry of freedom of the press is in reality but a subterfuge for the right to slant public opinion in favor of the media's own personal and political prejudices through sensationalism and biased reporting. Mr. Armstrong comments at length about this in big letter

So-called investigative reporting is a misnomer as a general rule for the blatant forms of yellow journalism because the investigator starts with his conclusion. That is the view which he wishes the public to hold, and then he carefully builds up to it through selective investigation, again frequently through undisclosed sources, selective and incorrect quotation.

My secretary found that out just the other.day. She very specifically gave a quotation to a new spaper reporter. He deliberately misquoted her because what she said was not friendly to him. But by dropping off a few words, he gave a completely different impression of the entire matter. And she called his editor about it.

The masquerade of investigative reporting as news is, therefore, in my opinion, essentially a sham. It could be good. This Supreme Court decision vesterday [April 18] may in fact make it good because no longer will the newspapermen or a magazine writer or a book publisher or a radio commentator or television commentator be able to libel somebody, or slander him, whichever it might be, and then on the public figure impose the burden of showing malice but then when his state of mind is questioned, the reporter says, No, no, no, you can't question me about my state of mind. The Suabout my state of mind. Oh yes.

preme Court says, Oh yes. Why did Mike Wallace after three hours and 30 minutes on camera in my office only use the pieces that he used? Isn't that pertinent? Very pertinent.

So if we bring an action against Mike Wallace, we will bring him in, and his producer, Mr. Goren, and all the other people, and we'll find out how it was after three hours and 30 minutes in my office, and maybe 25 to 30 hours elsewhere, he picked what he did. Did he pick it to do us damage? Yes, he did. And once we prove that, we will prove our lawsuit because what he said is also untrue. And truth would he his defense.

But usually they try to knock these people out of the box, not by the defense of truth, but they try to knock him out because they say. There was no malice, we were just reporting the news.

Now the Supreme Court has opened up a whole Pandora's box. And today's editorial – right away, the press comes out, right away. They don't wait a moment. Blood on the First Amendment, today's L.A. *Times.* Blood on the First Amendment.

First paragraph, "By meretricious reasoning, the U.S. Supreme Court reached a meretricious decision Tuesday that bloodied the First Amendment. In a 6-3 ruling, the court held a public figure suing for libel may inquire into the journalist's state of mind and into the editorial process.

"Associate Justice Brian R. White, writing the majority opinion, said the Second U.S. Court of Appeals misconstrued the First Amendment. We believe instead that the-Supreme Court savaged the First Amendment by this decision and misconstrued the nature and history of the liberty that has nurtured this patien for two centures."

I ask you, what about the First Amendment as it relates to religious freedom? Where were the headlines? (See FORUM, page 9)

In short, I want to remind you, to recapitulate before I answer your questions, I have said from the outse despite vilification from the press, from the dissenters, and unfortu-nately from the attorney general and his deputies in a privileged forum They have slandered me in the court. where they have an ab privilege.

I felt, because the moment that everyone now knows I have released my information, some dissenters will say, well, if Mr. Rader released his, why don't we give them 'Mr: Armstrong's? Why don't we give them Mr. Helge's? Why don't we give them everybody's information? The answer is, they do not have a right to it. Do you understand that? violation of the public trust. I've received many nice telegrams and letters since the Wallace thing. I was kind of pleased with one Mail gram from a complete outsider. Any of you heard of CORE — the Con-gress of Racial Equality? This is from Roy Inness, chairman and national director. He said he saw me on 60 Minutes, and "you handled Mike Wallace well. After seeing that show, I'm convinced that we have common enemies, and we may be facing elements of the same conspir-acy. Let us talk soon. Congratula-tions on a job well done."

I was in Europe during the war. My country was overrun by the Nazis, and I work here. And they followed the procedure that the attorney general has done here. And it's exactly the same process that the Nazis did, except we haven't seen any jackboots yet. But other than that, it's exactly the same.

Did you all hear that? This is a statement by a man whose country was overrun by the Nazis in the last world war, and he says what he saw is identical to what's happening here. We must be vigilant, all of us

Two questions. The first one in-volving our presence at the U.S. Supreme Court especially now since the State has sought to refile the suit against us, is that going to help us in our ...? We will bring a motion probably to

strike the amended complaint because it was untimely filed, and that will be heard in about 15 days. There's nothing in the complaint that helps their position, however. It's just kind of a rehashing of what was in the original complaint. And it won't have much bearing on what is pending now in the courts at the upper level

We're appealing to the Supreme Court again, not by way of appellate review. We're asking them again for an extraordinary writ. We're telling you have to understand it. We have not yet been reviewed at the appellate level by anybody. It's another way that Deukmejian lies. Now, again, I've said many people tell me that he just isn't a good lawyer. Others say he just doesn' know the law. Others say he has people who don't know the law. And these are friends of his. I mean people in the senate up there and the assembly, people who know him, apologizing for him. But in this letter I was looking for, he again indicates something that's not true. Nov

maybe it wasn't written for him but how long do we let him be less than responsible for the conduct of those working for him?

What he says in the letter is that four judges at the appellate level and three more judges, excuse me, four more judges at the Supreme Court level have agreed with what he has done. Now, that's not true. He knows that. As a lawyer he knows that. And when a lawyer lies, to me when he lies about the law, it is very significant. And I wouldn't trust him as far as I could throw him.

Now we have not yet been heard by an appellate court exercising ap-pellate review. What we have tried to do, you must understand this, is w have tried to intrude upon the appellate courts. We have said: "Stop ev-erything, stop it right now. What's late courts. We have said. "Sto happening to us is so bad you've got to drop everything, you've got to hear us now, and you've got to act now. You must issue what we call an extraordinary remedy. Don't let us remain in this appellate process. That takes too much time.''

And the Supreme Court came very close in California, you know that — 4-3. And the decision was handed down the day after we stayed the receivership by posting the bond. The question is, supposed they had heard, they had decided the week before when the bond had not been posted. Maybe it would have been 4-3 the other way.

So when the attorney general lies about appellate judges agreeing with him, that to me is monstrous because it doesn't mislead lawyers, it doesn't mislead informed people, but who does it mislead? It misleads the laity. It misleads the public, and that to me is criminal behavior — criminal behavior — by a law enforcement of-ficer, the chief law enforcement officer. Why can't he be honest about it? Ask yourself that. Maybe his dep-uty is right. He doesn't want to appear emasculated. Well, that's too bad. Make a mistake, admit it. Make a heinous mistake, admit it. It's all we ask

when it's finally heard by an But appellate court, we will prevail. There's no question about it, if the case ever has to go that far. But in the meantime, we're saying stop every thing. It's kind of like the way some people pray. They pray to God like they give an order to a waiter, and they hope that everything comes right away on hot trays. But you know that God doesn't act that all the time. He doesn't answer your

prayers like a waiter. He sometimes makes you wait.

Well, when we go to the Supreme Court, and we ask for immediate help right now, it's totally discretionary. Do you all understand that? They can say: We've got 4,000-cases, how are you being hurt? Sure, Judge [Julius] Title's a wrongheaded, arrogant, stupid judge. Sure, he did you a wrong, but you've appealed it, you're in the appellate process, there's no receiver here.

Do you follow that? That's all they've said. They haven't agreed with Deukmejian. All they've done is say: Look, go into the appellate say: Look, go into the appellate court. You guys are handling your-self pretty well. You've got the whole State of California buffaloed. That's really what they're saying. So they're saying: You people can handle yourself very well. When you need the help in the usual way, we'll be here. That's what we're here for Appellate courts are there basically to do what? Correct mistakes of lower courts, but through an appellate process.

Now, does everybody understand that? Because it's very important. What we've been seeking is extraordinary relief, which the court only allows a hearing in 5 percent of the cases. And then when they do give the hearing, they generally will rule in favor of the party seeking the relief about two thirds of the time That's why that 4-3 was very close, very close.

We had the chief justice and we had Mr. Mosque, who is the former attorney general, and we had Justice Richardson. We thought all along that we had Justice Tybriner, because he's been quite a liberal. But he must have been affected by the fact, I believe, that the court had been heavily pushed by the case load, and that we had just appealed the receivership. (TO BE CONTINUED NEXT ISSUE)



PASADENA — The following is a press release to the media from Church treasurer Stanley R. Rader April 19

Those of you who saw last Sunday's 60 Minutes segment relating to the Church may remember Mike Wallace's so-called tag line, in which he stated that I was "under investigation" by the Inter-nal Revenue Service for criminal tax evasion. This statement was no doubt intended to somehow bolster the thrust (both express and implied) of the segment, namely, that there is some merit to the patently ridiculous charges made against the Church, Mr. [Herbert] Armstrong, myself and others by the State attorney gen-eral, George "Duke" Deukmejian. My purpose today is not to refute

either the charges made by the attor-ney general or the charges of tax evasion made against me, all of which, I assure you, are absolutely false. Rather, my purpose here is simply to share my feelings and perceptions with you and, with your aid, to idenwith you and, with your aid, to iden-tify the lessons that we and others must learn from the abuse of gov-ernment power we have been wit-nessing these past few months and its treatment by the media.

What I find most instructive and revealing about the so-called tag line is that which was not said, or more aptly, that which was deliberately left out. First, although Mr. Wallace saw fit to tell millions of Americans that the Internal Revenue Service is "investigating" me for "tax evasion," he failed to disclose that I HAVE VOLUNTARILY GIVEN THE IN-TERNAL REVENUE SERVICE COMPLETE ACCESS TO ALL OF MY FINANCIAL REC-ORDS as well as my permission to look at the Church's financial records relating to me, and that the Internal Revenue Service has been conduct-ing its examination for approxi-mately 2½ months and has found no evidence of any wrongdoing. Moreover, Mr. Wallace also failed

to state that the investigation relates substantial part to several years in which both I and the Church were audited and given clean bills of health.

stated that his information regarding the so-called tag line was fathered from "[his] source," *HE* FAILED TO DISCLOSE, either during the main segment when I asked him or otherwise, WHO THAT "SOURCE" IS. I have no doubt in my mind that the "source" also was responsible for: a) the surreptitious and unlawful recording of Mr. Armstrong's tele-phone conversations, b) the instiga-tion and initiation of the attorney general's baseless lawsuit, and c) initiation of the Internal Revenue Service investigation itself.

Mr. Rader's April 19 statement

In this respect, I am reminded that commencing in 1974, the Church, Mr. Armstrong and myself were hounded and harassed for several years by the U.S. Customs Service in our travels spreading the Gospel, al-legedly seeking evidence linking the Church and its leaders to the smuggling of drugs, gold and diamonds. When we sought to ascertain, through the Freedom of Information Act, the identities of the people mak-ing these baseless accusations against us, we were told that even that law did not permit the disclosure of those "sources." Even after we demonstrated that the charges were false, the government still refused to tell us who had unjustly subjected us

to several years of harassment. Indeed, it is not unlikely that the same "source" — one or more dissident Church members out to de-stroy the Church for their own gain - is responsible both for our harassment by the Customs Service and for the instant wholesale State intrusion and Internal Revenue Service examination.

What lessons should we learn from these experiences? I believe that basically there are three. First, as the Watergate episode also teaches, gov-ernment officials are capable of monstrous abuses of power in the course of which they use government agencies as instruments to oppress those who do not share their beliefs and biases. "Enemy lists" whose members are, without just cause, subject to "investigation" by the IRS and other agencies, office break-ins and wiretaps are not figments of the imagination; they are, until political and religious freedom are restored in this country, the price that you, Mr. Armstrong, I and others may be paying for doing God's Work. Although we must fight against such oppression, we must bear it with pride while we carry out His will.

Second, government officials and agencies, in attempts to make names for themselves, procure larger budget appropriations and gain other political objectives, frequently act precipitously on the specious claims of venomous vipers, without any independent investigation or corrob-oration of those claims. To facilitate these attempts, however, the politicians keep the identities of the real accusers secret, lest the innocent vic-tim confront them and, in doing so, expose the politicians as the charlatans they are.

Finally, in its own inimitable way, Finally, in its own inimitable way, the media frequently is, intentionally or unwittingly, the primary instru-ment of oppression. Its cry of "free-dom of the press" is, in reality, but a subterfuge for the right to slam public opinion in favor of the media's own-percond read entitidue mentioners. personal and political prejudices through sensationalism and biased reporting.

So-called "investigative reporting" is a misnomer for the blatant form of yellow journalism; the "investigator" starts with his conclusion (that is, the view he wishes the public to hold) and carefully builds up to it through selective investigation (again, frequently through "undis-closed sources"), selective and/or incorrect quotation, and subtly placed innuendo. The masquerade of investigative reporting" as news is, therefore, a sham.

In short, I have nothing to hide, either from the attorney general or from the Internal Revenue Service. I have given all there is to give to the IRS regarding my financial ac-tivities. Why have I not done so to the attorney general? Because contrary to the professional behavior of the IRS, who rightfully has left the Church and Mr. Armstrong out of the matter, "Duke" Deukmejian has confused himself with "Duke" Wayne and ridden in, guns blazing at everyone in sight, but, in reality, only firing blanks.

On more than one occasion I have offered to provide to the attorney general the access I have given to the IRS on the condition that he dismiss his action against the Church, Mr. Armstrong and the other defendants and focus his attention on me if he feels I have done something wrong; my offers have been refused. As long as the attorney general insists on in-cluding the Church, Mr. Armstrong and the others, who under no set of circumstance should be involved in his harassment, I will use every lawful means in my power to frustrate him

In so doing, however, *I am not* "hiding behind" either the First or the Fifth Amendment; I am merely refusing to accede to or acquiesce in a clear abuse of power and flagrant violation of the public trust.
