### Outstanding Pentecost Festival!




Everything was so well co-ordinated the work progressed rapidly. The central theme was to get the job done.



## THE COMPENDIUM

A most important acquisition of the libraries of the churches of God in St. Louis and Harrisburg arrived recently. This is Dr. Herman L. Hoeh's COMPENDIUM OF WORLD HISTORY.

"A Historian is his own final authority," writes Dr. Hoeh, "he is not judged by, but sits in judgment of, history. History, in other words, is based only on that part of evidence which agrees with the prevailing opinions of the society in which a Historian lives."

After making this statement Dr. Hoeh proceeds with many pages of Dynasty charts and other historical data from the flood up to the point where history need no longer be con troversial. That is, the student can, with reasonable research, find the truth of history, from there on up to



modern times.


The Compendium is not a mere condensation of a mountain of data. This is a reference book, not a story book. Extensive research was required to compile this informative book——research, which the student could not do for himself. This is world history—not biblical chronology—but world history substantiated by biblical chronology.

take shape and the swimming pool looks almost ready to swim in!

After the walls take better shape, and more of the work on the interior is completed then comes the herculean task of putting on the pre-formed roof. In order to do this, the construction company is going to use two of the largest cranes in southern California to lift the sections into place.

When the sections are transformed from their present location at the construction company's grounds they will have to be transported on house moving equipment. They also will be ushered in with a police escort because they are so large. All of this is to take place in the morning hours in order to avoid snarling traffic.

This type of construction is the first to be used in the United States. It features pre-formed, pre-stressed concrete. Since this is a first as far as the engineering world goes, this particular project on the Ambassador campus will be carried in many of the leading magazines for architecture and engineering.
